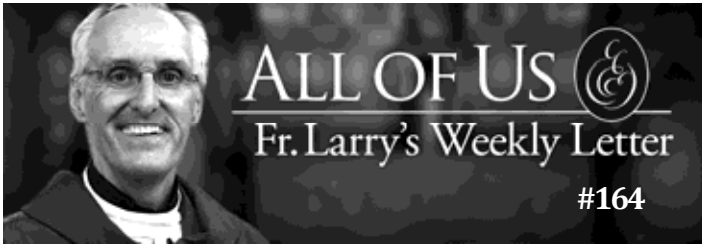

I flipped through the pages of my calendar and realized that the month of September is packed with a lot of “stuff.” Praise God that we have the Labor Day holiday on Monday so that with a long weekend we can still pretend that it’s the middle of summer and down shift back into a vacation mode.

I drew up a simple list of what you will encounter at Immaculate Conception and St. Joseph parish over the next four weeks. Our Parish Council, Parish Staff and other parishioners have been working hard behind the scenes to make things happen. Maybe there are one or more events that you will be able to participate in? I hope so.

- There are seven weddings to be celebrated at St. Joseph Church during September. Thank goodness for our wedding sacristans who point me in the right direction; and help to make the day a sacred and beautiful celebration of faith and love for the bride and groom and their families and friends.
- We will be recruiting and training more children from our Parish School and Religious Education Program to help as Altar Servers. It is one way to make our Sunday worship more meaningful for them.
- Our Parish Choir begins practicing, praying and singing with us on Sundays. It is great to have them back as they help to lift -up our voices in praise and thanksgiving to God.
- Our current Liturgical Ministers will have an opportunity for prayer, refectio, fellowship, and on-going training on Saturday morning, September 10th at Immaculate Conception Church. We are grateful for their commitment to proclaim God’s Word, to share the Eucharist, and offer hospitality and welcome to our community.
- Next Sunday, September 11th, at all the Masses, I will speak about our call to be good stewards of what God has entrusted to us. We do this when we share our time, talents and treasures. Stewardship, which is a true hallmark of a Christian way of life, supports the mission and ministry of Jesus. I will explain our upcoming *To Teach Who Christ Is* capital campaign and how it will greatly benefit our parish and the Archdiocese of Chicago.

• On “Catechetical Sunday,” September 18th at the 11:00 Mass, we will recognize and bless all of our teachers and catechists who serve in our Parish School and Religious Education Program. They collectively help over 500 children to learn about their Catholic faith. This is the biggest ministry of our parish.

• On the weekend of September 17th-18th, our parish will host a “Ministry Fair” as a way of explaining and inviting parishioners to become more involved in the life of the parish. We will highlight the top areas of parish life and the need for volunteers. There will be a variety of possibilities that you can check-out after Mass.

• We look forward to Bishop Frank Kane, our local Vicar, who is coming to our parish on September 25th and will preside at the 11:00 Mass. Together we celebrate the recent canonical combining of our parishes that took place on July 1st this year. So please save the date now so that you can attend the Mass and reception.

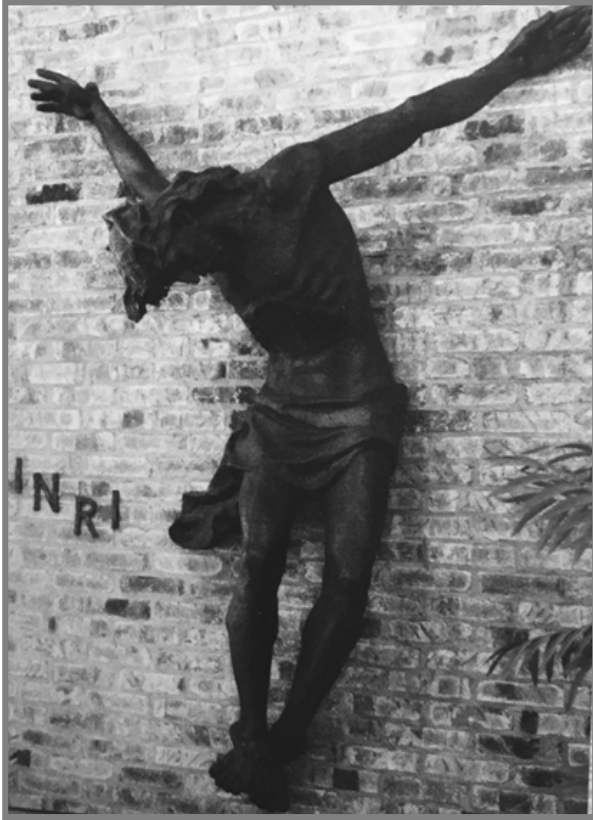

Oasis

Reflections on Mercy

#1: Year of Mercy ~ Oasis Reflections

*"In our parishes, communities, associations and movements... everyone should find an oasis of mercy."
~ Pope Francis*

"Oasis" is a provocative image. Although we are not a desert culture, we have travelled enough, seen enough movies, and read enough books to grasp the meaning. Oasis is a place of rest and resources in the middle of a desert. When we are there, we connect with our spirit before we return to the hardships of the demanding desert.

Without an oasis of mercy, the Pope sees life as: "fruitless and sterile, as if sequestered in a barren desert." In other words, unless we find mercy the desert will dominate.

Since mercy is so valuable, the Pope does not spare his praise. "[Mercy] is a wellspring of joy, serenity, and peace ... [It is] the fundamental law that dwells in the heart of every person who looks sincerely into the eyes of his brothers and sisters on the path of life."

But so much for praise!

What is it about mercy that is so core to our wellbeing and generativity?

The Pope has many insights, and we will ponder them. But basically he points to mercy as a personal path. "We need constantly to contemplate the mystery of mercy." His hope is that through this exercise of contemplation "the witness of believers might grow stronger and more effective."

This is a hard piece of advice. We cannot borrow someone else's mind and heart about mercy. We must walk the path ourselves and discover the ways of mercy and the life it gives us.

In order to do this, we will have an "oasis reflection" each month. This short reflection will guide our thoughts and feelings and bring us into a world where mercy lifts our minds and hearts and inspires our actions.

Jack Shea is a Chicago-based theologian who lectures nationally and internationally on storytelling in world religions, faith-based health care, contemporary spirituality, and the spirit at work movement. Teresa of Calcutta

Agnes Gonxha Bojaxhiu, the nun known to the world as Mother Teresa of Calcutta, was born to Albanian parents in what is now Macedonia in 1910. As a Sister of Loreto, she taught girls in her order's mission schools in India for twenty years. But in 1946, on a train journey in the mountains, she suddenly realized that God was calling her to something more--to care for the poorest of the poor.



In the city of Calcutta, many homeless people lived and died on the street. One day Sister Teresa came across a half-dead woman lying in front of a hospital. She stayed with the woman until she died. From that time on, she dedicated herself to caring for the poorest of the poor in India. She founded the Nirmal Hriday ("Pure Heart") Home for the Dying in a former temple in Calcutta, where poor, homeless people were cared for and allowed to die with dignity when no one else would have them. She also founded an orphanage and leprosy hospital.

Other young women, including some of her former students, soon joined her in her work with the sick, the poor, and the forgotten of Calcutta's slums. They formed a new worldwide order of nuns, the Missionaries of Charity. Like Mother Teresa, they wear a plain white, blue-edged sari, the traditional dress of Indian women. They live a simple, prayerful life, and take care of people all over the world wherever there is need.

Mother Teresa won several awards for her work, including the Nobel Peace Prize. She always used the money from such prizes to found new homes and hospitals for poor people. She died in 1997 at the age of 87. Her life and work remind us that happiness and holiness come from doing "something beautiful for God." She was beatified in 2003, and will be canonized on Sunday, September 4, 2016

Vigil for Peace
in the spirit of Taizé

In light of recent incidents of violence and racial tension in communities across the United States, U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops has invited all dioceses across the country to unite in a Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities.

On July 8, in his initial and immediate response to the racially-related shootings in Baton Rouge, Minneapolis and Dallas, Archbishop Joseph E. Kurtz of Louisville, Kentucky, noted the need to look at ways the Catholic Church can walk with and help these suffering communities. The initiatives announced today begin to address that need.

"I have stressed the need to look toward additional ways of nurturing an open, honest and civil dialogue on issues of race relations, restorative justice, mental health, economic opportunity, and addressing the question of pervasive gun violence," Archbishop Kurtz said. "The Day of Prayer and special Task Force will help us advance in that direction. By stepping forward to embrace the suffering, through unified, concrete action animated by the love of Christ, we hope to nurture peace and build bridges of communication and mutual aid in our own communities."

The Archdiocese of Chicago will hold a 7pm prayer vigil in the spirit of Taizé on Thursday, September 8 at Holy Name Cathedral. All are welcome to participate.

The National Day of Prayer for Peace in Our Communities will be celebrated on the feast of St. Peter Claver, September 9, and will serve as a focal point for the work of the task force.

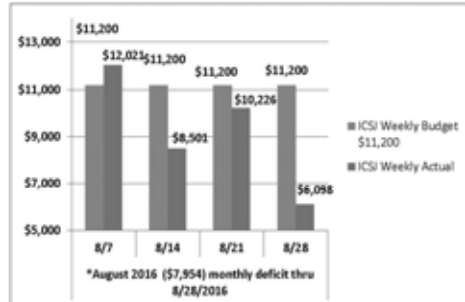

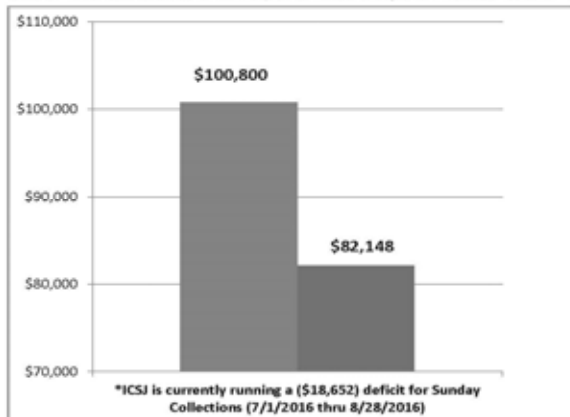
