Respect Life Sunday: Cherish. Defend. Protect.

This weekend begins Respect Life Month in the Catholic Church, with today being Respect Life Sunday. As Catholics, we are called to cherish, defend, and protect those who are most vulnerable, and one way we do that at ICSJ is through our refugee ministry.

ICSJ's refugee ministry is now six years strong. It's a ministry that began with a nudge from parishioner Betty Woodward as a reminder—to those of us who are so comfortable here in our parish, our city, our country—of what it might feel like to have to leave our homes with only what we can carry.





In 2016 the pilot group began meetings to brainstorm how a refugee ministry could be successful at our parish. In January of 2017, they learned of the first family they would be sponsoring, a family of six from Afghanistan, where the father had been an interpreter for our US Military. With that news, the group began seeking funds to help this family upon their arrival—they would need to raise \$8,000. They

calculated that if every family in the parish donated a minimum of \$25, that goal would be reached. Well, every ask was met with a resounding "YES!", and they were blown away with overwhelming generosity, receiving nearly \$20,500! In March of 2017, after months of training and preparation, our first family was greeted at O'Hare by Father Larry and three of our refugee volunteers, representing all of

ICSJ's parishioners. There was palpable gratitude and excitement as this family was welcomed into our family of families.

Due to the outpouring support from the first refugee collection, ICSJ was asked to adopt a second family





just months later in June. From that time on, the ball has not





stopped rolling and we have adopted 10 families in six years! That totals over \$73,000 dollars raised for refugee resettlement and assistance. ICSJ has welcomed families from

Afghanistan, Myanmar, Rohingya, Ethiopia, Burundi, Sudan, Syria and most recently this past June, from Yemen. Alongside Catholic Charities and Exodus World Service, ICSJ's refugee volunteers have welcomed and stuck with

these families—they have been stalwarts in helping, advising, and providing them with what they need. There have been baby showers, English lessons, countless playdates, birthdays celebrated, driving lessons, shared meals, gained citizenship,

city outings, and even babies named after volunteer children! Some of our families have been able to move away to establish themselves in other locations, and are thriving, and it is awesome to see how these families have become such wonderful assets to our country. Thanks to each of you who have made dreams come to life for these families through your generosity. Being a refugee volunteer is not easy, rather it requires
